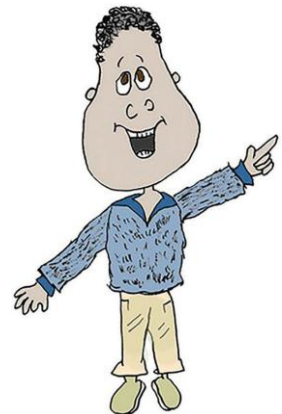
remember, in each country they visit, they have a pal that just so happens to be named after the capital of that country (like Little Rome, who lives in Italy).

Western Europe is also where six microstates (small republics or principalities) are found. These interesting countries are among the smallest in the world. Most are merely the size of large towns! As a special treat, your buddy, Mickey, will take you on a quick journey through these wonderful places.

A country can be part of Europe, even if it does not lie entirely on the mainland. For example, the island countries of Iceland, Ireland, and the United Kingdom are located in Western Europe, although they are not on the mainland. Many people who live in these places don't consider themselves to be "Mainland Europeans."

Other examples are the transcontinental countries, which lie partly in Europe and partly in the continent of Asia to the east. In the case of Russia, most of the country is in Asia. However, its European part alone would be the largest country in Europe! Your pal, Tricia, will finish your travels with a tour of these fine countries.

One more thing!

As you shall see, we have divided Europe into several regions (such as Central Europe). In most cases, these regions are simply groups of countries that lie near each other, and these groupings provide a way to help learn where each country of Europe is located. These regions do not necessarily group countries that are alike in their geography, politics, or culture, although many of them do share similarities.

In fact, others place some countries in different regions than are shown here. For example, Germany could correctly be considered a Central, Western, or Northern European country. Plus, there are some countries, such as Armenia and Cyprus, which are not considered to be part of European geography but play important roles in European culture and politics.

And the number of countries in Europe still seems to be growing!

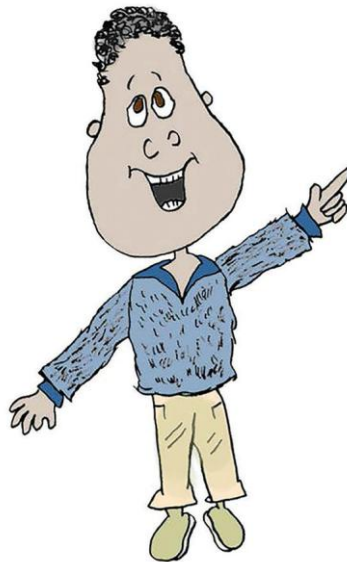
One example is Kosovo, which is located in Southern Europe.

Austria is home to composers Joseph Haydn and Johann Strauss. The Northern Alps of Austria are one of the homes of Alpine skiing.



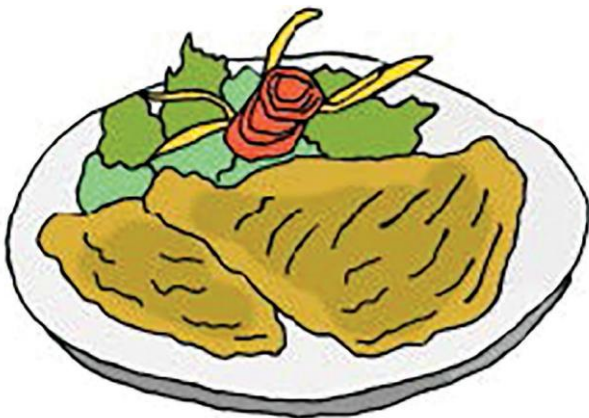

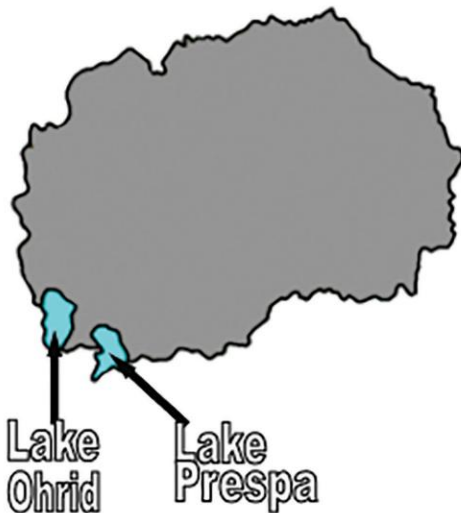
NORTH MACEDONIA

Ireland is the biggest zinc producer in Europe. The Gaelic people are predominant in Ireland, the Scottish Highlands, and the Isle of Man.

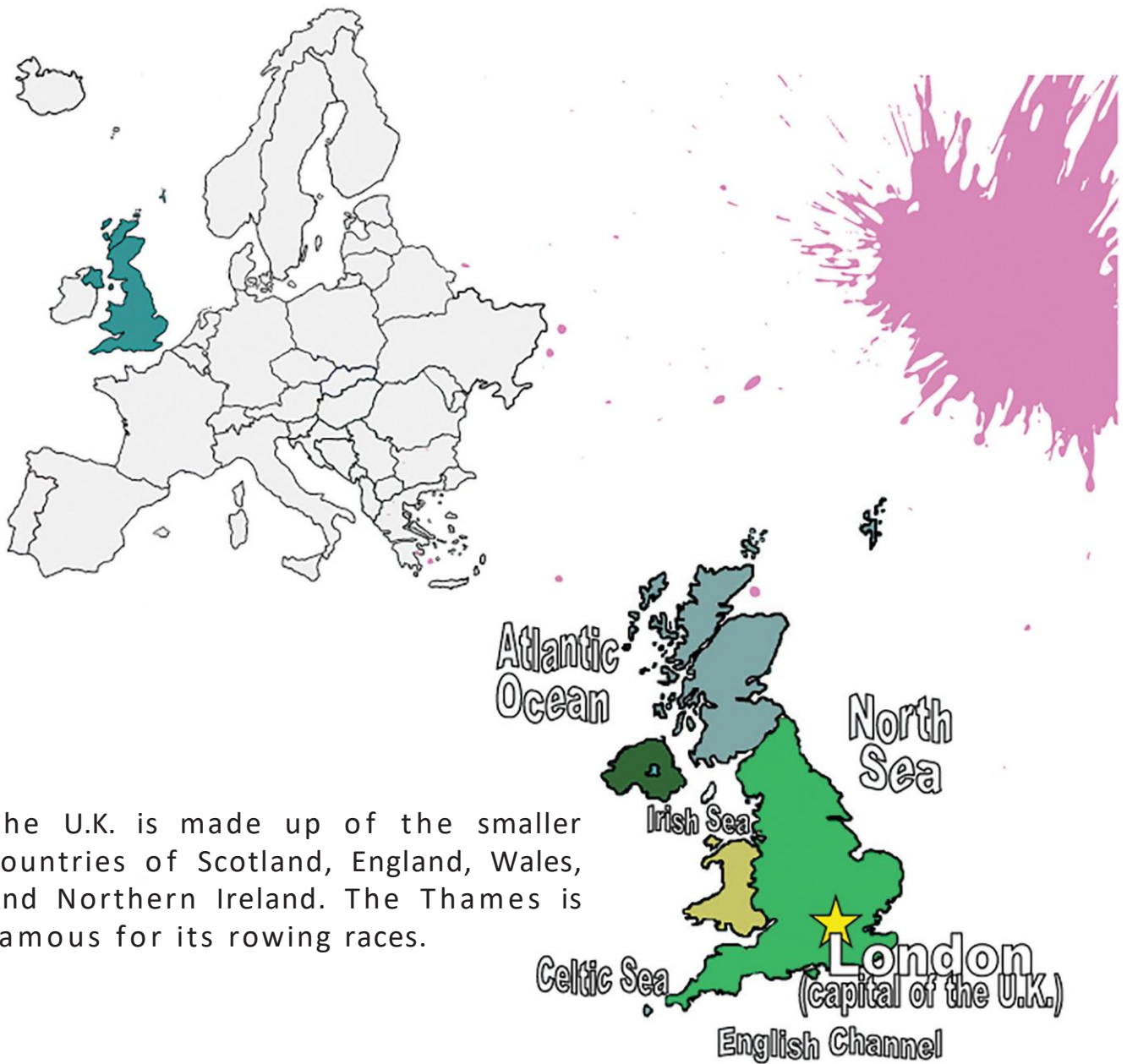

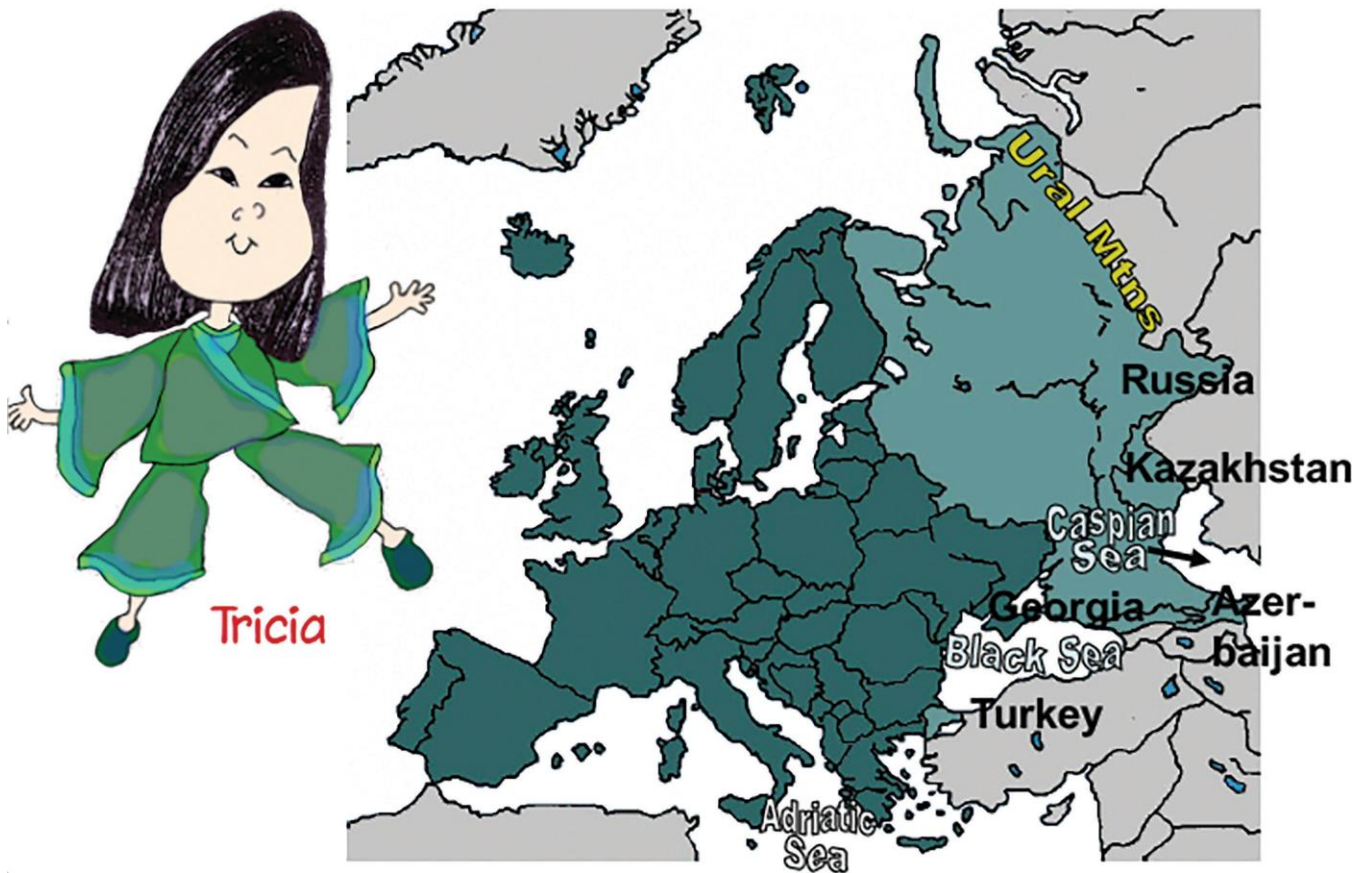


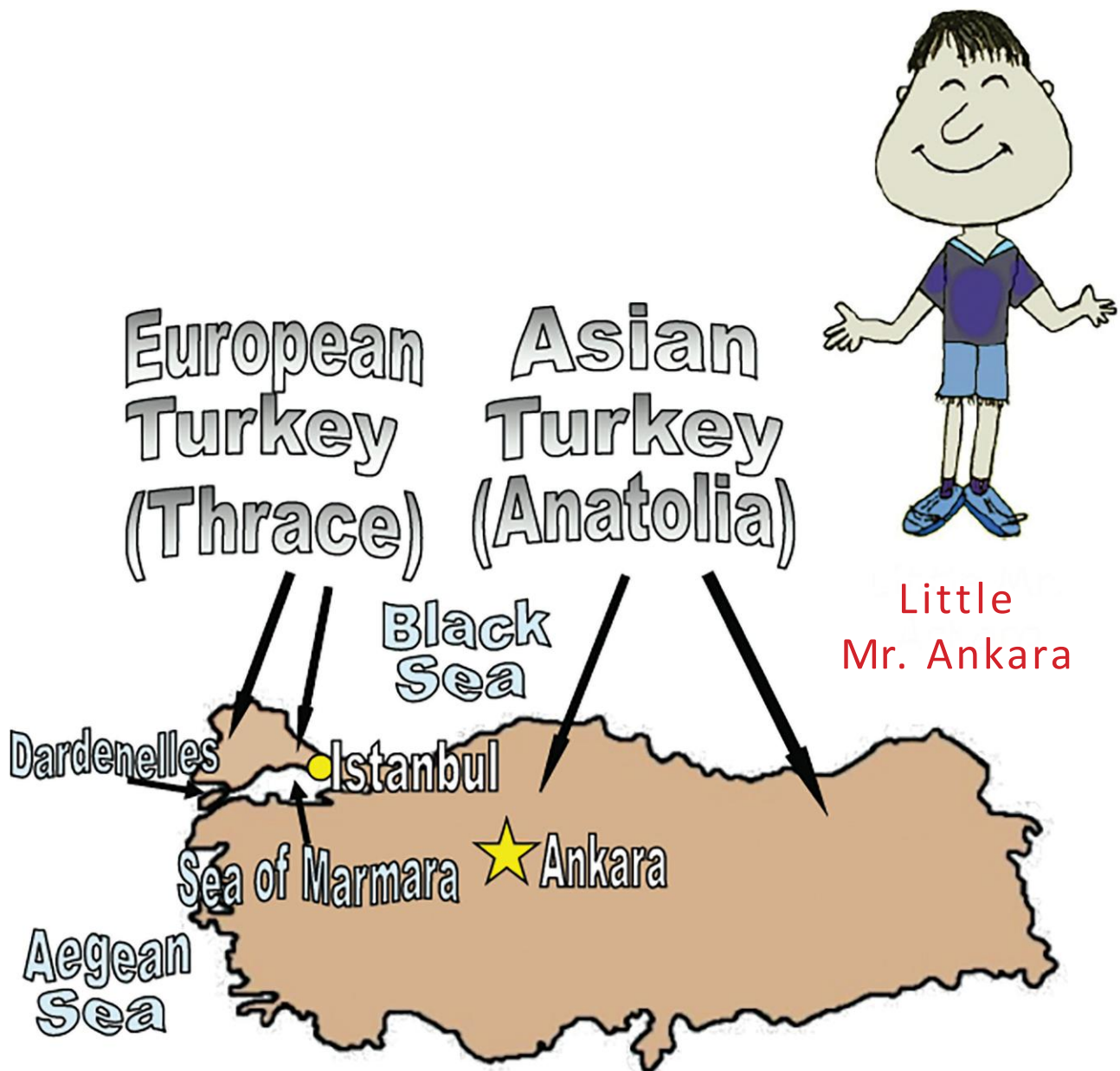


While the rest of his friends

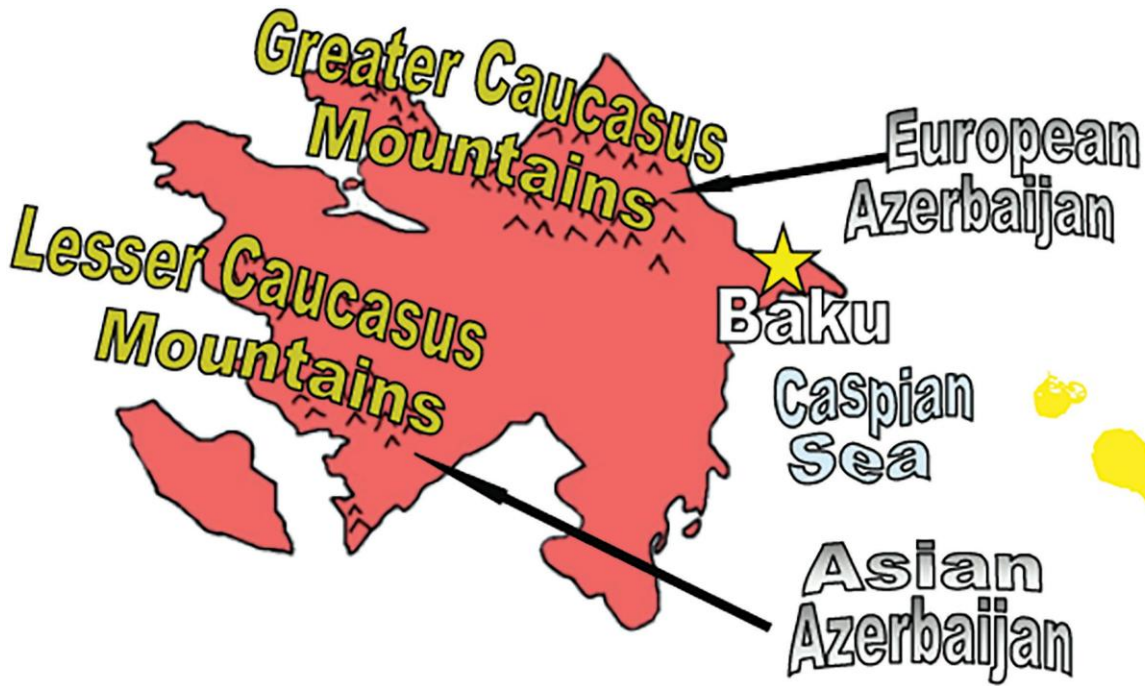

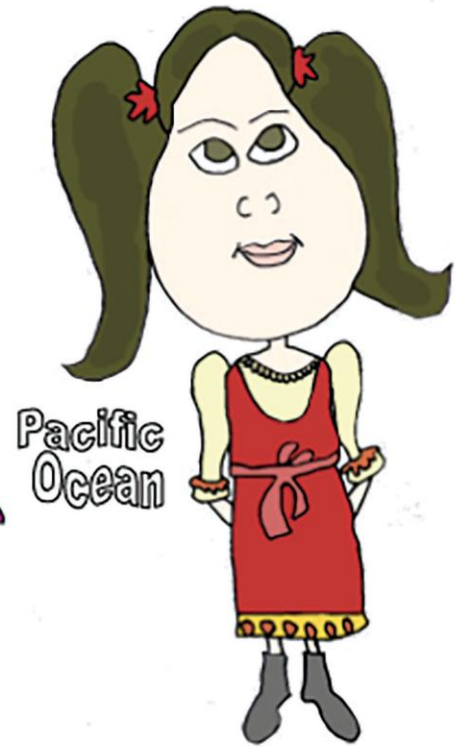

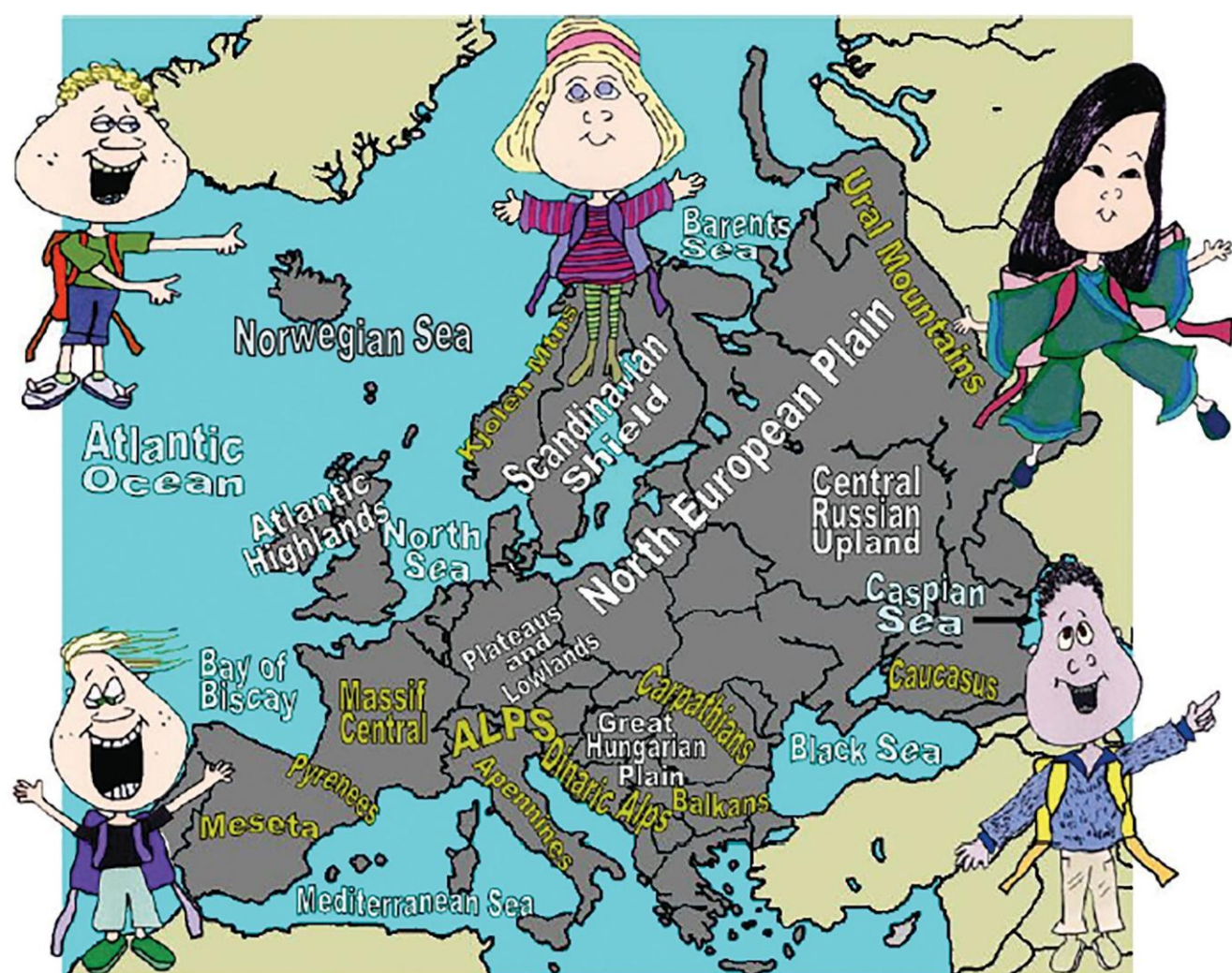
The Ural Mountains are usually considered the continental border in Russia. Only one-fifth of Russia is west of the Urals, but this area is larger than all of Western Europe!

The five friends meet with back packs in hand to explore once again this incredible land.

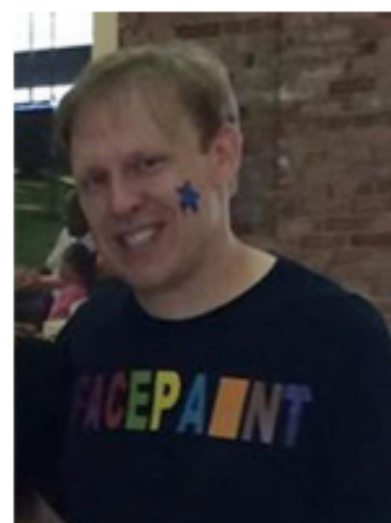


Author Bios

Ken and Ellen launched FACEPAINT, a family-operated 501(c)(3) that provides free educational books/video/film to support social and cultural awareness.

Their publications include short stories and poetry published in *PKA's Advocate* (bimonthly literary tabloid), *The Writing Disorder* (quarterly online literary journal and print anthology book), *Unconditionally Her* (formerly *New Focus Daily*), and *Natural Solutions* (formerly *Alternative Medicine Magazine*). The cancer memoir, "From Both Sides," was published in *Bewildering Stories*. They published several children's/YA books by small presses, including Galde Press (Friends and Mates in Fifty States (2008)) and Chipmunkapublishing (Gathering Roses (2007), All Across Canada (2008), All Across China (2009), All Across Europe (2010), Fruit of the Vine (2011)). These have been widely distributed to schools, public libraries, Little Free Libraries, homeschoolers and parent centers throughout the U.S. and Canada.

FACEPAINT, in collaboration with Lonely Lane LLC, produced the award-winning 3D animations, "Justin and the Werloobee," "Full Moon," and "Making Emmie Smile," based on their published children's stories. Their work



strives to promote kindness and empathy, love and friendship.

Ken and Ellen performed for several years as part of a circus troupe. This troupe, also called FACEPAINT, promoted social awareness to Boys and Girls Clubs, retirement homes, and nursing homes throughout New England.
